In fact, two (2) major laws have already been enacted and most of the remaining bills are progressing in the legislative mill as of end of December 2017.

THE LEDAC COMMON LEGISLATIVE AGENDA (LEDAC CLA)

The LEDAC CLA is a harmonized list of priority legislations that were reviewed and vetted by the NEDA Secretariat as the principal Secretariat of the Council taking into account the



legislative priorities mentioned by the President in his July 25, 2016 and July 24, 2017 State of the Nation Address (SONA) and the following three major documents:

1. President's Legislative Agenda (PLA);
2. Common Legislative Priorities of Congress (CLPC); and
3. Philippine Development Plan (PDP) 2017-2022 Legislative Agenda.

The NEDA LEDAC Secretariat, as instructed during the 1st LEDAC Meeting held on 30 January 2017, has prepared the proposed LEDAC CLA based on the President's SONA, the Common Legislative Priorities of Congress (CLPC) as officially submitted by Senate President Pimentel and Speaker Alvarez and the President's Legislative Agenda (PLA) as presented to the Cabinet and approved in principle by the President. NEDA also took into account the legislative agenda contained in the 2017-2022 Philippine Development Plan and applied a vetting and prioritization process to ensure that the LEDAC CLA will contain the most urgent measures that will greatly contribute to the attainment of the 0 to 10-point Socioeconomic Agenda of the President.

The NEDA LEDAC Secretariat convened the first LEDAC-ExeCom meeting last July 13, 2017, primarily to formulate the proposed LEDAC CLA for the 17th Congress. In the said meeting, the ExeCom extensively discussed the measures included in the list of the PLA, CLPC, and PDP 2017-2022 and came up with a list of 28 measures as the proposed CLA. The ExeCom approved it for endorsement

and final approval by the LEDAC Full Council. The CLA consists of a list of twenty eight (28) measures, fourteen (14) of which were also recommended by the ExeCom to be further certified as urgent by the Council to emphasize the necessity of having them passed into law possibly within the year¹.



During the 2nd LEDAC Meeting held on 29 August 2017, the Council approved the proposed list of 28 priority measures as the LEDAC-CLA for the 17th Congress.

On September 20, 2017, the LEDAC once again convened to further discuss the significance of these measures and agreed on the mechanisms to be pursued by both branches of the government, as well as the

other key stakeholders, to ensure that these measures will be enacted into law.

OTHER SIGNIFICANT MEASURES DISCUSSED DURING THE LEDAC MEETINGS

- Possible termination of Barangay Elections

The President said that the next election will not be a clean election unless he can clean-up the whole apparatus of drug-tainted barangay officials who use drug money to stay in power. He expressed that the next barangay election will be colored with violence, hence, will not reflect the true sentiments of the people because he believes that while it has been established that the majority of barangay officials are involved in the illegal drug trade, the cleaning up of these barangays have not been completely pursued and the government has yet to put a single official in prison.

- Amendments to the Juvenile Justice Act

The President stated that the weakness of the act is the automatic release of children in conflict with the law (CICL) and he believes that the CICL must be subjected to inquest proceedings and should subsequently be detained, not as prisoners, but as wards in government facilities.

- Amendments to Anti-Money Laundering Act (AMLA)

The President expressed that the Anti-Money Laundering Council is a very loose agency and must be looked into by Congress.

- Bangsamoro Basic Law (BBL)

The President said that there is a need to carefully study provisions in the draft BBL because there are provisions that maybe putting the national government at a

grossly disadvantageous position such as the creation of regional armed forces or other provisions that may be contrary to the Constitution. The President also emphasized the need to urgently pass the BBL to address the historical injustices against the Moros and allow them to profit from their ancestral domain and gain independence.

OTHER ACTIVITIES OF THE LEDAC

- Appointment of sector representatives to the LEDAC



To fully constitute the Council, President Duterte appointed Mayor Maria Laarni L. Cayetano as LGU representative, Mr. George T. Barcelon as the private sector representative, and NYC Chair Cariza Y. Segueria as the youth sector representative

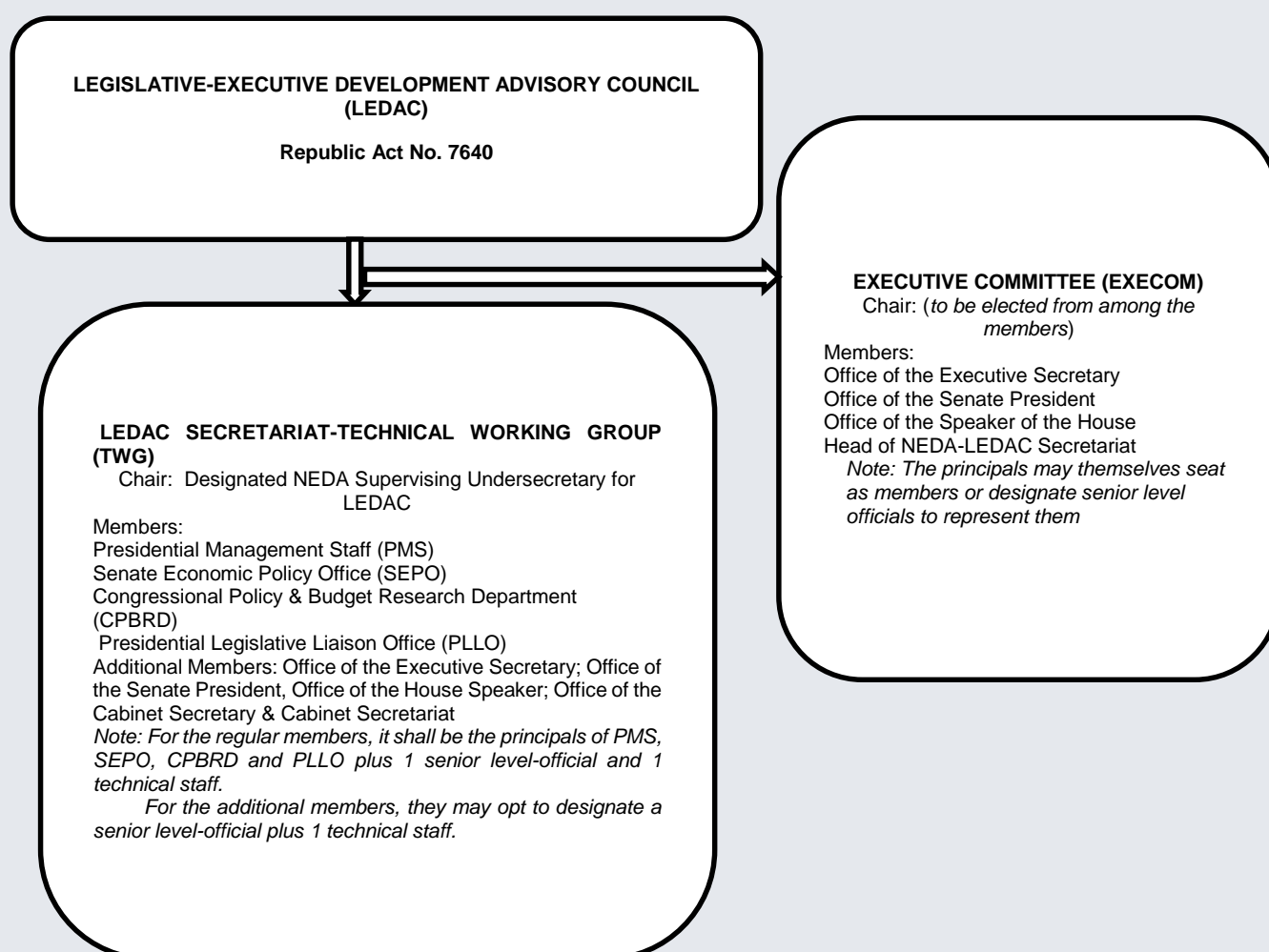


- Reactivation of the LEDAC Executive Committee (LEDAC-ExeCom)

The President committed to convene the newly reactivated LEDAC, as frequently as possible, to maximize the collaboration with the members of the LEDAC representing both Houses of Congress, the local government units, the private sector and the youth.

- Approval and Adoption of the LEDAC Structure and its Subcommittees

The Council approved and adopted this working structure to ensure that an interim body, namely the Executive Committee (LEDAC ExCom), will be able to attend to LEDAC activities if the Council is not officially convened, as well as, facilitate decision making in between regular council meeting. The LEDAC Technical Working Group (LEDAC TWG) adhoc structure was also institutionalized to permanently serve as technical arm of LEDAC ExCom.



In line with its mandate, the LEDAC Secretariat provided the following technical and administrative support to the Council, including its duly constituted subcommittees:

A. Coordinated the conduct of the following Council, ExeCom and TWG Meetings that required complete staff work before, during and after the meetings - notification of meeting to the attendees; coordination with the offices of meeting participants of their availability on the proposed meeting dates and confirmation of their attendance thereof; preparation of agenda folders, presentation materials and other materials needed for the meeting (discussion flow, agenda briefs, discussion papers); coordination/preparation of logistics with concerned offices; and preparation of the minutes of the meeting/highlights/summary of agreements/matters arising:

By 2022, the LEDAC envisions to become an effective high-level advisory and consultative body to the President that ensures consistency in executive development planning and congressional budgeting by providing the mechanism for generating consensus among the different sectors of the economy.

The LEDAC aims to develop, strengthen, and sustain interaction and collaboration among the executive and legislative branches of government and stakeholders to facilitate the provision, adoption, and implementation of appropriate policies, which aim to achieve the country's socioeconomic and development goals.

Mission

The LEDAC serves as a mechanism for consensus-building among the executive and legislative branches and key stockholders on vital issues affecting the country's socioeconomic and development goals.
